And also, next to St Thomas's Church was Fords', which is now going to be Wetherspoons, the Germans dropped a spare bomb that they had and it went right through the middle of Fords and it didn't touch the church and it didn't touch the dairy next door. I was staying in Church Lane with my school friend and there was heck of a noise and of course it was in the middle of the night so we had to wait to the next day to see what had happened. Also there was ack-ack guns down Normandy Lane, I think it was in Hallsey's Farm. Also, there's a bomb dropped, I think round- about Viney Road.

There are seats on both sides so we had to sit down and keep quiet (laughs). And then there was a ladder and an escape, sort of, hatch. If anything happened to the main, sort of door, then we had to go up this ladder to get out from the escape hatch. Yeah, It's quite nice down there. I'm trying to think...., it smelt something along the line of Jeyes fluid from what I can recall (laughs).

I should think we had a military presence somewhere in Portmore more because towards the end of the war, my parents, myself, and my sister used to walk around there to Portmore and we sae the concrete, sort of bases, where I think the tanks used to stop and then they were there one day I suppose and gone soon after. Other than that we didn't have..., we couldn't go out at all because parents wouldn't let us. We'd to come home from school and stay indoors. That's as far as I know I can remember (laughs).
